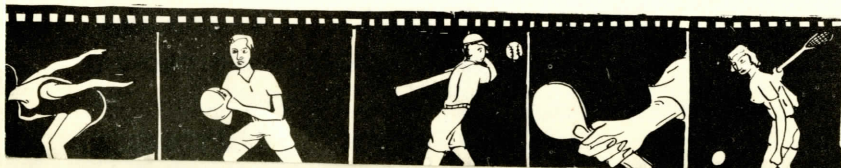

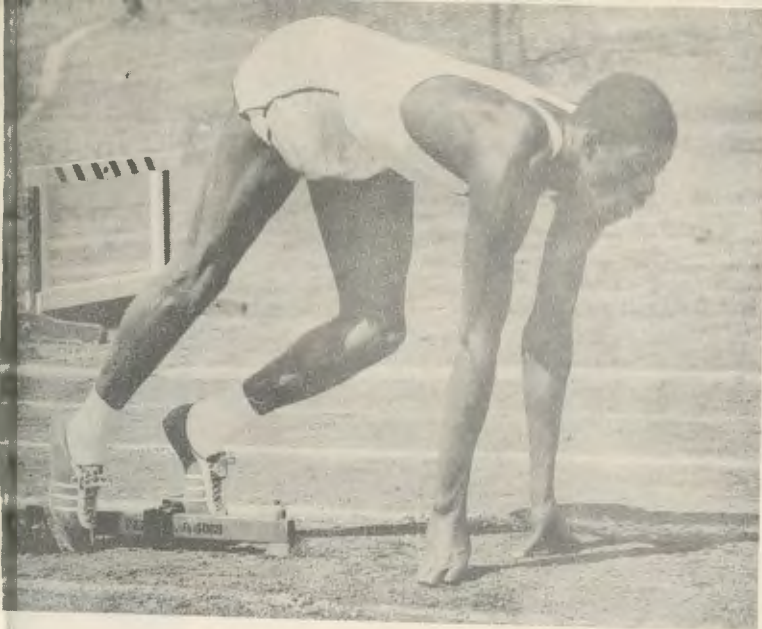


Dear Alumni, Former Students and Friends:
